

Great Farm Challenge





Background

Great Farm Challenge is an **inter-college competition** aimed at **agricultural students** in the UK where students attend a day of **interactive workshops run by stakeholders** and a **farm walk/tour with a chosen innovative local farmer**. Great Farm Challenge is run by Natural England, with input from water companies and Catchment Sensitive Farming.

The workshops and farm walk cover topics such as are air quality, water quality, good farming practice and soil health.

The students write a report based on the days learnings and the reports are judged, and then the teams that scored the highest from each agricultural college in East Anglia are invited to a **final day with a keynote speaker and award ceremony.**

A successful way to share a common message

Since Great Farm Challenge began in 2011, **over 1,440 agricultural students have engaged** and got involved in learning about improving water and air quality and how to implement best practice on farms.

In 2019, nationally 270 students took part, with 20 Catchment Sensitive Farming Officers, 5 water companies and 12 host farmers. In the Anglian Water region, we have held Great Farm Challenge workshops at five colleges; Riseholme College, Shuttleworth College, Moulton College, Easton College and Otley College- a success, as it was Shuttleworth's first time back on board with the project for a number of years educating 60 agricultural students.
